## October Activity Directions

### Fire Escape Writing Prompt

In this activity, students imagine they have woken up in the middle of the night to the sound of the fire alarm and the smell of smoke. They write a story describing how they and their family escaped safely. This writing prompt is intended to be used at the end of a fire safety unit after such procedures have been clearly explained. 




Pumpkin Request Letter
Many families are willing to donate pumpkins for special lessons in October. This form letter makes it easy to request such donations. Just fill in the date you need the pumpkins and sign the letter, then print copies to send home with stud



Halloween Point Piot
Working with a partner, students plot points on the coordinate grid. There are
four rows of points; students take turns being the Coordinate Caller or the Point
Plotter, switching roles after each row. At the end of each row, they make a
prediction about what the mystery object will be. After the last point is plotted,
they connect the points in a logical manner (not in the order listed on the paper)
to outline the object (a pumpkin). If time allows, they may color the pumpkin.



Each team of four to five students will need one pumpkin. Have students number off around the team, and Person #1 becomes the first recorder.

Each person makes a guess about the height of the pumpkin and Person #1 records each estimate. Then Person #1 measures the height of the pumpkin to the top of the stem and records it in the far right column. Repeat the same steps with the remaining dimensions, allowing each person on the team to take a turn being the recorder and measurer for one dimension.

This word problem worksheet has four problems that can be completed over the period of a week or on a single day. Students must show their work in picture or word form. Because some problems deal with measurement and money, there are two versions of this worksheet, an American Version and an International Version. The answers for each version are shown below

## More October Activity Directions

#### Spooky Story Starters

Put on some spooky music and let the writing begin! It's fun to use these four story starters as a cooperative learning activity. Give one to each student and have them write for about 5 minutes. Then stop the music, have them pass their papers to the next student on the fearn, and start the music again. Students read the new ue that story for five minutes more times and then ask students to esk. Then let them share the final stories



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#### Spooktacular Story Board

This is a great activity for the week before Halloween. You can do the activity in a few long "Reading Marathon" sessions or spread it over the whole week. Each student chooses a fiction book to read for independent reading time. Every 15 to 20 minutes, have them stop and complete one section of the story board. ## Halloween and Fire Safety Word Finds

Students cut out the letters at the bottom of each page and then move them around to form words. The words they find do not have to be related to Halloween. The directions assume students are working with a partner, but they can work alone as well. When working in pairs, it's best if each student has his or her own set of letters and a recording page. Give them about 10 minutes to find as many words as possible on their own, and then allow them to consult with their partners to find more words and check the spellings of all words.





## Pumpkin Talk Science Investigation

This activity requires you to use a lit candle, so be sure to get approval before conducting the lesson. You'll conduct this as a demonstration in which students alternately observe you and discuss predictions with a partner. Assign partners before the activity and make sure they are seated where they can see the pumpkin but are not too close. Observe all necessary fire safety precautions and quickly end the activity if the matches or candle begin smoking excessively. Setting off a fire alarm would not be good!

#### Halloween Homework Passes

Give your students a Halloween Homework pass on Halloween to allow them to relax and enjoy the fun without worrying about assignments. Students who don't celebrate Halloween or who do their homework anyway can save the pass for later. If you don't want to excuse students from doing homework, tell them that the pass will allow them to turn their work in one day late without penalty

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





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## Pumpkin Talk

## Questions to Explore Air and Heat

Advanced Preparation

This activity involves the use of a candle, so be sure to get approval if needed. In addition to teaching the science concept, you can use the activity to model fire safety, being sure to tell students not to try the activity at home without parent supervision. Before the activity, cut out the pumpkin lid and remove the seeds. The lid must fit very tightly. If it doesn't, use day to fill up the gaps. Secure the candle in the bottom of the pumpkin using a candle holder or piece of clay. Don't carve the jack-o-lantern face ahead of time heraitse vou'll do that during the lesson. It you visit, you can draw the time because you'll do that during the lesson. If you w face on the pumpkin to save time later.

- Procedure

  For each question and answer, follow this procedure:

  1. Ask the question and have students think of their own answer.

  3. On a signal, ask students to pain with a partner to discuss ideas.

  4. Call on several students to share ideas, but don't reveal the answer.

  5. Do the activity to find out the answer.

#### Questions

Q1. If I light the candle and put the lid back on, what do you think will happen? Al. The candle goes out.

Q2. Why did the candle go out?

A2. Fire needs oxygen to burn. When you put the lid on, the fire can't get oxygen.

Q3. Will the candle stay lit if I carve eyes in my pumpkin and replace the lid? A3. No. The candle burns briefly and then goes out.

Q4. Why did the candle go out?

A4. Since the lid is on, the used air cannot flow up out of the pumpkin. Therefore,

Q5. If I remove the lid, will the candle stay lit?

A5. No. If the candle is short, it will still go out. The warm air rises and pulls in fresh air, but the flame is still in a pocket of stale air.

Q6. If I carve a nose and mouth and don't put the lid back on, will the candle stay lit?

Q7. Why does the candle stay lit now?

A7. Warm air rises. As the stale air rises, it pulls fresh air in through the eyes, nose, and mouth. The candle continues to burn as long as it is getting air.

Q8. Will the candle continue to burn if I put the lid back on?

A8. Yes. Even with the lid on, warm air will rise through the eye holes and pull in fresh air through the mouth. Students can observe this air flow if the candle is smoking a little.
